Encourage extra-curricular activities

This is a great way for your child to meet new friends. It also helps build up playing together as a team.



Remind your child often that new friends don't replace their 'old' friends. Especially when they are the only ones going their new school. Make arrangements for your child to visit his/her 'old' friends when possible.



Give your child time to adjust to the new school. There is often a very different routine, different activities and some activities might go at a faster pace than that your child is used to. Give your child (and yourself), the chance to feel comfortable in their new space. It might take a few months before things will settle.
